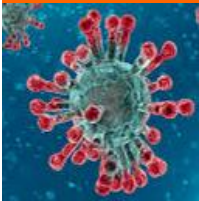

PLIGHT OF MIGRANT LABORERS

UTTAR PRADESH

*67 kilometer long
journey by foot
march,
waiting for 32 days,
3 days bus journey
and finally reaching
home
after two days of
medical check-up.*

Bundelkhand region of Uttar Pradesh that was once known for its bravery and prosperity and a region where people used to visit and are attracted for its best water management practices has been facing drought, famine, poverty and unemployment for the last two decades.

Every year thousands of people of Bundelkhand region migrate for agricultural wages, where they work hard in 2 months and earn money to survive for 3 to 4 month in migration. 10 year back these people do not migrate outside the region but due to the mechanization of crop harvesting system they were deprived of their work and were forced to migrate to far flung areas.

Jaishalmer and Jodhpur district in Rajasthan-close to Indo-Pak border - are known for cumin cultivation and tiny size of cumin plants they cannot be harvested by machine. So it has to be harvested manually and looking this opportunity large numbers of people of sheopur and Shivpuri districts in Chambal and Bundelkhand regions have also started migrating for Jaishalmer for their livelihood. This year too these people migrated to Jodhpur and Jaishalmer districts located at a distance of around 1000 kilometer from Jhansi.

Tribal community of Sukwa and Dukwa villages of Babina tehsil(block) in Jhansi are dependent on labor work for their survival and they don't get the labor job in their surrounding areas. On March 12, i.e. immediately after Holi, 375 people of this villages migrated to Jaishalmer.

Laborers leader Basudev stated his problem that as soon as they started work for 7 days, sudden on March 24 lockdown in the country was declared in the country. The moment (day) they came to know that all train and bus services were stopped in the country and there was no way out for them to go back to their home villages they were staying in the farmland by con-



structing a huts of Plastic sheets. Landlord of the field had arranged a drinking water by water tanker as there was acute problem of water since it was desert area. Some of the workers started leaving the place immediately after declaration of lockdown in the country but this family worked 4-5 days more in the lockdown but after that the work of harvesting crops was stopped and they did not have any work after March 30. They had to spend money they earned on food. But after one week their drinking water was also reduced considerably and people of these villages were under pressure to go back to their home villages. At this moment they did not have any option as to what to do and where to go. In such situation these people contacted Jai Singh bhai of Ekta Parishad on phone and told him how they were stuck in the lockdown and there was no way out for them to return.

As a result, people of Ekta Parishad contacted many Non-Government Organizations, Political representatives and government officials to arrange food for these people. Facing the problems, they all 375 people left for reached Falaudi after marching 65 km in 3 days by foot march on April 27 where police stopped them and ther. A school was arranged for way out to proceed further except constantly contacting but mobile bal-Ekta Parishad resolved this problem numbers and they put money in 9 handsets so that they could continue the way. They were constantly be-Falaudi. Some literate laborer laborers and prepared a list.

Lockdown literally swallowed one year bread of those 375 tribal People who had migrated from Bundelkhand region.

In the third phase of lockdown government took decision and Ekta Parishad made contact with higher level officials of Rajasthan Government they agreed to send back laborers of Uttar Pradesh and all 375 people in Falaudi were dropped in Agra in 12 buses where these people had to wait for over 4 hours and after that Uttar Pradesh government made arrangement to send all these people to Jhansi. Hence all these people arrived at Jhansi after three days of their long journey and screened for health check up. They stayed in the school and then they dropped in their village by the government buses.

All the laborers felt immense relief after reaching there as they shared the same when people of Ekta Parishad talked to each of them. They said that they any how saved their lives and they would never travel so long distance for labor work whether they would have to die of starvation. They said that they had passed their toughest time in the last one and a half month. Santosh, his wife Imarti and their eldest son Sanjay, who had gone there for harvesting cumin, said that they were losing patience but people of Ekta Parishad kept on consoling and motivating them and with their support they reached safely in their villages.

Joura: It is rarely seen that the government and the voluntary organization work jointly mutual understanding on a single issue, but today Corona epidemic has reduced the gap between the government and civil society organization, as a result both are working for relief of marginalized community from Corona.

The Pahadgarh area of Morena in Chambal valley of Madhya Pradesh is known for its backwardness, where most of the population belonging to Dalits and Sahariya tribal, whom are totally dependent over the agricultural wages and migration. They could not earn properly this year due to the lockdown announcement.

They migrated to Rajsthan and

So far, under this joint initiative, the district administration has given 30 quintals of flour, 6 quintals of rice 600 soaps and EP/ MGSA given 6 quintals of lentils, 600 liters of mustard oil, 6 quintals of salt, 1.80 quintal spices and 3600 masks.

3rd round of relief materials to migrant laborers

Ekta Parishad manage 40 kg flour and 4 liter edible oil for them, while in Bangru nearby Jaipur stranded laborers got help of 60 kg flour for 59 migrant laborers of Sheopur.

Returning of Migrant laborers from Rajasthan and Gujrat

200 laborer of Sheopur stranded in Kachchha area of Gujrat hired 3 buses to reach their village at the rate of Rs. 2500 for each one. Another group of laborers of Bandhali village stranded in Nasirabad neary Ajmer in Rajsthan reached Itawa (a border village, 45 km from Sheopur) by goods couriers transport with the help of police then they started foot march to Sheopur. MJVS provides food packets to 50-60 migrant labor daily

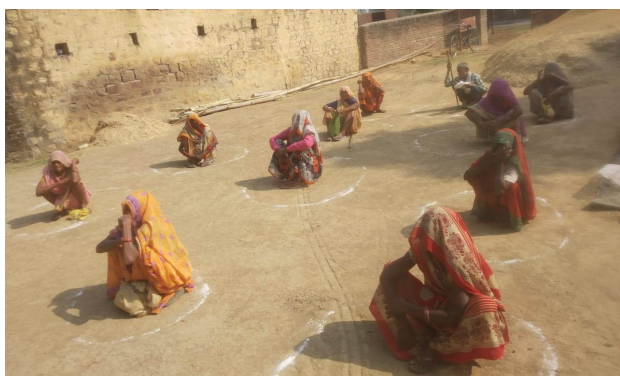

Stranded migrant laborers helped through networking

Odisha is one of the most backward states of India. The number of migration / migrant labour has been increasing day by day due to food insecurity caused by devastation of forest economy, destruction of natural resources, large scale displacement due to mindless mining and industrial expansion. The prolonged unemployment, marginalization and hunger force the people to migrate to other states in search of employment and livelihood. In addition, the frequencies of natural disasters like cyclone, flood and drought are also making the people more vulnerable and food insecure. Every year around 20 lakh people are migrating from Odisha to Andhra Pradesh, Tamil Nadu, Uttar Pradesh, Gujarat, Karnataka and other States. While a majority of people from coastal Odisha go to Gujarat and other States, nearly 3 lakh people from western Odisha migrate to Andhra Pradesh, Tamil Nadu and Karnataka mainly to work in the brick kilns. These migrant labour are facing more hard time than ever before due Corona virus Pandemic.

Contact and Online Survey for Migrant Labour:

Online survey of migrant Labour was conducted by the Ekta Parishad Covid-19 Response to identify migrant labour by contacting them and finding out about the places where they are stuck,



their situation and their urgent basic needs but also to arrange support for them immediately or directly through the local Ekta Parishad unit team or its partners or Contractors or to link with or refer them to both state administrations/authorities to take urgent actions.

Thus, Ekta Parishad State unit Odisha started contacting and collection information about migrant labour who are stranded in many states of India.

Within a few days they could contact with around 1500 migrant labour stranded in the state of Gujarat, Karnataka, Maharashtra, Tamil Nadu, Kerala, Andhra Pradesh and Telangana states. They also started filling up online survey form.

Migrant Labour supported by Ekta Parishad, Andhra Pradesh / Telangana:

PitabasJani and Jitu Jani of Baduda, Bamia Berbera Gram Panchayat of Banpur Block of Khordha District who are stranded in Brick Kiln in Andhra Pradesh. There are 170 migrant labour out of which 30 are from Odisha and 140 from states. Ekta Parishad senior leader of Andhra Pradesh/ Telangana arranged and provided 15 days of food materials to migrant labour in the brick kiln.

Govt. Relief Officer of Odisha helped women workers in Karnataka:

Pravasini Pradhan of Dolagobinda Nuasahi, Niladriprasad Gram Panchayat ,Banpur Block of Khordha District of Odisha is working inTexco Fashions Survey company along with 200 more women from Odisha. When Ekta Parishad team contacted them, it was found that they were very scared, hopeless since their food materials and money they had were going to be finished very soon.

It was kind enough of Asimaji, an Odisha Govt. officer who is deputed as relief in-charge in Karnataka state, to have visited and met with the workers and even discussed the matter with the company owner. The company agreed to release advance salary of Rs. 5000 each and gave assurance for their safety.

Ekta Parishad supported Migrant Labour in Tamil Nadu:

Pitabas Sabar from Kosarada village, Damia Berbera, Gram Panchayat, Banpur Block of Khordha District, is a migrant worker working in Chennai, Tamil Nadu along with 20 other migrant workers (6 from Odisha and 14 from West Bengal). All of them were worried that they did not have enough food to eat. After contacting Tamil Nadu Team by senior leader Ekta Parishad of Andhra Pradesh/Telangana, the team rushed to the site and provided food materials for 7 days.

Plights of migrant laborers : Road and relief work



Bihar/MP: Entire country is facing the lockdown problem due to the Corona. All the means of transport are closed. The central and state government has started the special trains and buses for labor but it is not sufficient. Most of the migrant has started to return their home at any how and they are foot marching, some time sitting in freights vehicles from Maharashtra, Gujrat and other states. There are no transport and no food restaurant at the highway that marchers can feed themselves. Most of the marchers are hungry for one or two days.

Looking the plights of laborers, Civil society organizations has started serving meals (dried grain, flour of dried gram) and drinking water (lemon water or jaggery with water) to laborers at National Highway no. 2 (Grant Truck Road) at Gaya. A marcher coming from Mumbai told that he paid Rs. 500 to a mediatory for a pass and it was said that the car will come even after spending the week, no car came then they started walking towards the home. They have received a lot of help from the administration in Madhya Pradesh and Uttar Pradesh. Father Anto Jhon, Jagat Bhushan of Ekta Parishad, Senior social activist Karu Bhai, Mithilesh Kumar, Nirala Ramdev, Brij Das and Ajay Manjhi are contributing for this work. MJVS Katni has been providing meals to migrant laborers, who are going their homes by foot and other transport. Every morning they packed pudu and pickle for 50-60 people and brought to the highway Tol Plaza and served to needy persons.

NYP provided foods to 77 households

Manipur: Kwatha village is one of the backward and very small villages which is located in the far and remote hill area of Tenoupal District of Manipur. This village is situated near the International Border Line of India and Myanmar. 'From hearsay, this village has been existing from the days of kind Senbi Kiyamba - 1467-1508' (*Arambam Kapil*). As per the Census Report 2011, there are 77 households belongs to Schedule Caste Community with a population of 327 (167 Male, 160 Female, and children age 0-6 is 31).

The main sources of income for the villagers of Kwatha are fermented Bamboo Shoots (Soibum Khangba). But it has been affected due to the flowering of bamboos in recent past years. It will take up to 10 years to start from the beginning. Cultivation of Rice is also the brink of because of the menace of rodents. Procuring Charcoal (Metan Louba) becomes the only means but it is seasonal and so the source of income is almost to the level of zero. The reason for its backwardness, this village was adopted as a model village under Saansad Adarsh Gram Yojana (SAGY) in Jan. 2018.

Above the problems which the villagers of Kwatha have been facing, the national wide lockdown due to Corona virus pandemic, these villagers are facing much more hardship for their day to day basic needs.

Thus, the National Youth Project - NYP, Manipur State Council organized a One Day COVID -19 awareness and relief Camp in Kwatha Village on the 9th of May, 2020. Around 40 persons including executives namely Y. Khogen Singh, President, L. Bijoy Singh, Vice-President, Ms. Nandarani Devi, Secretary and other members and volunteers of NYP Manipur from different districts of the state have participated in the Camp. With the money, the council collected from well-wishers, members, and volunteers of NYP, Manipur, a food items packages (Atta, Dal, Edible oil, Sugar, Tea leave powder, Salt, Dry Fish (Ngari), Papad, Biscuit, etc) and Soaps and Masks were distributed to 89 families.
